COLLABORATION between two friends is providing visitors to the Roma on Bungil Art Gallery with a rare treat this Easter.

Glenmorgan based artist, Carol McCormack has teamed up with Roma poet, Jock Douglas, to produce the Connecting with Country exhibition, which will run at the Roma Gallery until May 4.

The exhibition follows the release of a coffee table book featuring Jock's poetry and Carol's paintings, Collection - Connection, recently released by the duo.

Mr Douglas and Mrs McCormack have clearly drawn upon their lives in the bush to create the book which takes the reader on a journey across remote parts of Australia through its beautifully crafted words and pictures.

We have known each other for many years and quite a while ago I showed Carol one of my poems and she said that if I ever wanted to publish a book of poetry she would like to do the pictures," Mr Douglas said.

Many of Mrs McCormack's paintings feature elements of Aboriginal art including traditional dot style work.

"I have been painting in remote parts of Australia for many years and was one of the first artists to visit Purnululu in 1986." she said. "This had a profound effect on my way of seeing our Australian landscape and I have been attempting to align what I see and what I feel in various ways ever since.

When I am in their land, it seems to say to me, this is what I am, this is how you paint me. It's almost a compelling force.

Maranoa Shire Mayor, Rob Loughnan, will officially open the Connecting with Country Exhibition on Easter Saturday evening.

Cr Loughnan will also officially launch Mr Douglas and Mrs McCormack's book, Collection-Connection, that evening.
